- BETWEEN -

THE INTERNATIONAL UNION OF BRICKLAYERS AND ALLIED CRAFTSMEN

AND THE

ONTARIO PROVINCIAL CONFERENCE OF THE INTERNATIONAL UNION OF BRICKLAYERS AND ALLIED CRAFTSMEN

Hereinafter called the "Union"

AND

THE MASONRY INDUSTRY EMPLOYERS COUNCIL OF ONTARIO

(Employers Bargaining Agent) Hereinafter called the "Employer" ALL REFERENCE TO EMPLOYEES AND EMPLOYERS IN THIS AGREEMENT INCLUDES BOTH MALE AND FEMALE AND WHEREVER THE MALE GENDER IS USED IT SHALL BE CONSTRUED TO INCLUDE MALE AND FEMALE.

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PURPOSE

WHEREAS, the general purpose **of this** Agreement is to establish mutually satisfactory arrangements between the Employers and their Employees and to provide machinery for the prompt and equitable disposition of grievances, and to establish and maintain satisfactory working conditions, hours **of work**, wages and fringe benefits for all the Employees who are subject to the provisions of this Agreement.

THEREFORE, it is expressly agreed and declared by and between the parties, both individually and collectively as follows:

ARTICLE 1

Recognition and Sub-Contracting

- (a) The Employer **recognizes** the Union as the exclusive bargaining agent for Bricklayers, Stonemasons and Plasterers, their respective Apprentices, Improvers and Working foremen in his employ in the Province of Ontario, in areas described in Appendix "B" hereto.
- (b) The Union recognizes the Employer as the exclusive bargaining agent for all members as outlined in Appendix "A" and any other Employers desirous of entering into a contractual agreement with the Union in the geographic areas as described in Appendix "B" hereto.
- (c) Any Employer who is a party to this Agreement desirous of contracting or sub-contracting any work encompassing the skills of members of the Ontario Provincial Conference shall only contract or sub-contract same to a contractor or sub-contractor who is bound by the Provincial Agreement with the Ontario Provincial Conference.
- (d) Without restricting in any way the application of the subcontracting provision contained in Article 1 (c) of this Agreement, an Employer who undertakes a contract with an owner to provide construction management services shall be subject to Article 1 (c) unless:
 - The owner selects contractor(s) not bound to this Agreement to bid on work covered by this Agreement and solely and directly solicits or obtains bid(s) for such work from such contractor(s) without any involvement or participation by



- the employer in the selection of such contractor(s) (except as to the validity **of the** bids) **or the** solicitation or obtaining **of any** bid(s) **from** any contractor(s) regardless of whether it (they) is (are) bound or otherwise to this Agreement;
- ii) The owner accepts bid(s) from contractor(s) not bound to this Agreement; and,
- iii) The owner contracts or subcontracts directly with contractor(s) not bound to this Agreement without contractual obligation of the Employer for the work of such contractor(s), otherthan for thenegligent acts or omissions of the Employer.
- **(e)** Any failure to comply with Article **1 (d) of this** Agreement shall render the Employer liable for damages equivalent to those for the breach of the subcontracting provision set forth in Article **1 (c)** above.
- **(f)** The Employer shall advise the owner of the provisions of Articles 1 **(d)** and 1 **(e)** when undertaking the construction management services contract.

Conditions of Amendments and Duration of Agreement

This Agreement shall be in effect from July 28th, 1995 until April 30th, 1998, and thereafter every three years unless written notice be given not more than 120 days and not less than 60 days before the expiry day (or its anniversary as the case may be) by the Party desirous of change. Onreceipt of such written notice the Parties to this Agreement shall convene a meeting within 30 days and endeavour to reach an agreement.

ARTICLE 3

Grievance and Arbitration Procedure

(a) Any dispute between a Local Union and a Local Employer or any grievance by any Employee covered under this Agreement which arises out of the interpretation, application, administration or alleged violation of this Agreement shall be adjusted if possible by the Local Union Representative and the Local Employer or his designated Representative. A meeting between the Local Union

Representative and the Local Employer or his designated Representative shall be called within two working days of receipt of the dispute or grievance by the party grieved against. If the dispute or grievance is not settled within three working days of such receipt then the grieving party shall refer it to its bargaining Agent (the Ontario Provincial Conference or the Masonry Industry Employers Council of Ontario, as the case may be). Copies of all grievances and the decisions of all local grievance meetings must be initialled and submitted to the Ontario Joint Conference Board. On receipt of the dispute or grievance the grieving parties Bargaining Agent will meet with the Bargaining Agent of the other party within ten (10) working days to attempt to settle the grievance. Should the dispute or grievance not be settled within fifteen (15) days from the date of the receipt of the grievance, then the dispute or grievance may be submitted to the Ontario Joint Conference Board. It is understood that the Union and the Employerwill make every effort to use the above three step procedure on interpretations disputes, before referring the dispute to the Ontario Labour Relations Board.

- **(b)** Where any difference between the Employer and the Union arises from the interpretation, application, administration or alleged contravention of the Agreement then either party may submit a grievance to the Ontario Joint Conference Board. The Board shall meet as soon as conveniently possible to consider the grievance.
- **(c)** The object of the Ontario Joint Conference Board is to establish fair working conditions and regulations for both the Employer and the Employee in the Construction Industry and to maintain industrial peace by resolving disputes and grievances which ariseunder this Agreement from time to time. Its duties shall include:
 - attempting to resolve disputes and grievances prior to arbitration.
 - ii) investigating and recommending methods to improve trade practices, efficiency, productivity and standards of workmanship in the industry.
 - iii) attempting to improve labour relations between Employers and the Union,
 - iv) promoting the best interest of the industry generally.

The Ontario Joint Conference Board shall have equal representation from the Employers and the Union. It shall meet at the request of either party. The Board may from time to time elect a Chairman who shall be neither a Representative of the Union or Employer. Grievances presented to the Board shall be dealt with at meetings of the Board. After **fully** hearing both sides of the matter, the Chairman may decide on the disposition **of the** grievance presented to the Board and such disposition shall be submitted to the Board for approval (or disapproval). The decision of the Board shall consequently be recorded as a minute of the Board.

- (d) Arbitration Procedure Where a difference arises between the parties hereto relating to the interpretation, application or administration of this Agreement, including any question as to whether a matter is **arbitrable** or where an allegation is made that this Agreement has been violated, either of the parties may, after exhausting the grievance procedure established above, notify the other party in writing of its desire to submit the difference or allegation to arbitration, and the notice shall contain the name of the first party's Appointee to the Arbitration Board. The recipient of the notice shall within live (5) working days advise the other party of the name of its Appointee to the Arbitration Board. The two Appointees so selected shall, within five (5) working days of the appointment of the second of them, appoint a third person who shall be the Chairman. If the recipient of the notice fails to appoint an arbitrator, or if the two Appointees fail to agree upon a Chairmanwithin the time limits, the appointment shall be made by the Minister of Labour of Ontario, upon the request of either Party. The Arbitration Board shall hear and determine the difference or allegation and shall issue a decision, and the decision shall be final and binding upon the parties and upon any Employee or Employer affected by it. The decision of a majority shall be the decision of the Arbitration Board, and if there is no majority the decision of the Chairman shall govern. The fees and expenses of the Chairman shall be borne one-half by the Union and one-half by the Employers. Any other costs or expenses in connection with such Arbitration shall be borne by the party which incurs them.
- (e) No dispute or grievance shall be considered by the parties nor shall it be subject to the provisions of this Article unless it is presented within twenty (20) working days from the date the Local Union and/or Union became aware of the alleged dispute or grievance.

- (f) Where a particular clause or article of this Agreement may be found to work a hardship in a specific geographical jurisdiction of a Local Union, either the 'Local Union or Local Employers Group may request a meeting with the other to consider the hardship in question. Shouldthe Local Union and Local Employers Group agree to amend the Collective Agreement to address the hardship such Agreement shall be made in writing and referred to the O.P.C. and M.I.E.C.O. for their endorsement. Where no agreement is reached the issue will only be referred to the O.J.C.B. by agreement of both the Local Union and Local Employers Group.
- **(g)** Job Targeting It isunderstood and agreed by both parties that it is the intent **of the** parties to take all necessary steps through Job Targeting to ensure the survival and orderly growth of the **organized** Masonry Construction Industry.

In the event that it is proven that a Local Union unreasonably and continuously withholds permission for Job Targeting, then the matter may be referred to the O.J.C.B., who will assist he local parties to reach an agreement.

It is furtherunderstood andagreed that all Signatory Employers shall co-operate to the fullest extent in bidding those projects targeted by a Local Union. The Employers in all cases of Job Targeting shall request similar arrangements with the Local Labourers' Union.

ARTICLE 4

Work Stoppages

During the lifetime of this Agreement the Employer and the Union agree that there will be no strike, and the Employer agrees that he will not cause a lock out. The parties further agree that they will not threaten to take any of the action which, under the provisions of this Article, they have expressly agreed they will not take.

ARTICLE 5

Union Security

(a) The Employer agrees to first hire members of the Local Union on projects within the territorial area of the Local Union. The Employer shall hire through the Local Union Office 50% of

all Bricklayers, Masons and Plasterers who are members of the Union as long as the Local Union is able to supply members in **sufficient numbers** to **take care of the needs of the** Employer. This ratio shall be maintained all times. It is agreed **that the** Employer may transfer members **from** one job to another within the territorial jurisdiction of **the Local** Union. It is agreed that all members must produce areferral slip signed by the Business Representative before being hired or starting work.

- (b) This also applies to out-of-town men coming to work within the jurisdiction of the Local Union and no other means of hiring will be allowed. All Employees in the employ of the Employer shall be members in good standing as long as they are employed by the Employer. It is agreed that the Union will give preference to the Employers in the employment of its Union members and the Employers agree to first hire and to employ Local Union members.
- (c) Where a Union has more than one Hiring Hall list in the areawhere the work is to be performed, and **ifthere** are insufficient members available in the area to take care of the needs of the Employer, then the Employers have the right to bring in members of the Local Union who do not reside in the area where the work is being performed until such members residing in the area where the work is being performed become available.
- (d) Should the Employer's requirement not be met within two working days, he shall have the right to hire employees from other sources, providing such employees make application to become members of said Local Union prior to commencement of work.
- (e) However, should members of the Local Union become available at any time during a regular work week; it is understood that out-of-town employee(s) shall be allowed to complete the work week employment before being replaced by the local employee(s).
- (f) Transfer of employees from one Employer to another shall only be by mutual agreement of the Parties to this Agreement.
- **(g)** It is hereby agreed by the Union that the Employer has the right to transfer one Foreman per project within the Province of Ontario.

Management Rights

The Union agrees and acknowledges that the Employer has the exclusive right to manage the business and to exercise such right without restriction save and except as such prerogatives of management may be specifically modified by the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Without restricting the generality of the foregoing paragraph it is the exclusive function of the Employer:

- (a) To hire, direct, promote, demote, lay off, transfer, discipline and discharge any Employee and to increase and decrease working forces, providing that a claim for discriminatory promotion, demotion or transfer, or a claim that an Employee has been discharged or disciplined withoutjust cause may be the subject of a grievance and dealt with as herein provided.
- **(b)** To determine the materials to be used, design of the products to be handled, the facilities and equipment required, scheduling of work and location of equipment.

ARTICLE 7 Safety

It is mutually agreed by both the Employer and the Union that they shall comply with the Occupational Health and Safety Act 1978 and Regulations for Construction Projects and as amended from time to time.

ARTICLE 8

Apprentices and Improvers

- (a) The Employer and the Union mutually agree that, in the best interest of the Industry, Apprentices shall be hired and properly trained and further agree that a Provincial Training Trust Fund shall be established. The amount of contributions and deductions shall be as defined in article 19 and 29 of this agreement.
- **(b)** Indentured Apprentices must be registered with the Industrial Training Branch, Ministry of Skills Development.
- **(c)** The Parties agree to establish and maintain Local Apprenticeship Committees consisting of equal representation of the Employers and Union. The Apprenticeship Committee shall

be responsible to ensure that Apprentices receive proper training in all aspects of the Trade and to review the progress of the Apprentices at regular intervals.

(d) The minimum rate for Apprentices and Improvers shall be:

50% of a Journeyman's rate for the **first** period. 65% of a Journeyman's rate for the second period. 80% of a Journeyman's rate for the third period. 90% of a Journeyman's rate for the fourth period.

(e) The minimum rate for Apprentices who successfully complete the modified Apprenticeship Program at the Ontario Masonry Training Centre shall be as follows:

65% of a Journeyman's rate for first "400 hours" on the jobsite. 72% of a Journeyman's rate for the next "400 hours" (401-800). 80% of a Journeyman's rate for the next "400 hours" (801-1200). 90% of a Journeyman's rate for the next "400 hours" (1201-1600). 100% of a Journeyman's rate after 1600 hours on the jobsite.

- (f) Unless an Apprentice or Improver is registered and recognized as an insulation or air barrier installer, then no Apprentice or Improver shall operate a masonry saw, install insulation or air barriers for more than twelve (l2) hours in any one (1) work week.
- (g) The Employersparticipation in wages while the Apprentice is attending Trade School shall be a minimum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) per week. However, an Apprentice shall apply and if eligible to receive U.I.C. benefits, this shall not be applicable when such benefits commence.
- (h) For the purpose of continued employment Apprentices or Improversmay betransferred to any Local of the Union, providing that the Local Union in which the Apprentice is to work does not have any Apprentices or Improvers available for employment.
- (i) The ratio of Apprentices or Improvers to be applicable to any one project shall be one (I) Apprentice or Improver for the first Journeyman employed plus an additional Apprentice or Improver for each additional five (5) Journeymen employed; said Apprentices or Improvers will be registered with the Union and will be paid rate of wages not less than stated above.

ARTICLE 9 Older Members

- (a) The Employer agrees that where six (6) or more Employees are employed, that the Employer shall hire, ifavailable, one (1) Employee who comes within the category of "Older Member." The Union further agrees that the Older Member may be hired either before the work force reaches the number of six (6) or when a seventh (7th) Employee is required and similarly as the Employee work force increases.
- **(b)** It is understood and agreed that the employment of Older Members means that the ratio applicable is in terms of the total number of the Bricklayer, Stonemason or Plasterer work force employed in the Trade by a single Employer.

ARTICLE 10

Holidays and Overtime

(a) Work performed in excess ofregular hours of work Monday to Friday shall be paid at the rate of one and one-halftimes the minimum wage rate as defined in Article 29 (Wages) during the first two (2) hours. Double time of the minimum wage rates as defined in Article 29 (Wages) shall be paid for work performed in excess of the first two hours. Work performed on Saturdays, Sundays and the following Holidays: New Year's Day, Good Friday, Victoria Day (or Birthday of the Reigning Sovereign), Canada Day, Civic Holiday (Local), Labour Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day, Heritage Day (whenever Heritage Day shall be declared a holiday by the Government of Ontario under the Employment Standards Act), shall be paid at double time at the minimum wage rate as defined in Article 29 (Wages).

When a holiday named above falls on a Saturday or Sunday, then the following Monday or the next regular scheduled work day shall be taken as the holiday. (i.e. if Christmas falls on a Sunday and Boxing Day is Monday then both Monday and Tuesday shall be considered holidays). Should Canada Day fall on a Monday to Friday weekday, it shall be taken on the day on which it falls.

Wherever all other Building Trades Locals in a particular area have Remembrance Day as a recognized holiday, by Collective Agreement, then for the purpose of this Agreement, Remembrance

Day shall be **recognized** as a holiday and **Employees**:**covered** by this Agreement in **that particular area** shall receive the double time rate for work performed on Remembrance Day.

(b) For Locals #1 Hamilton, #6 Windsor, #23 Samia, #25 Thunder Bay, #29 Sault Ste. Marie.

Work performed in excess of regular hours of work Monday to Friday shall be paid at the rate of double time the minimum wage rate as defined in Article 29 (Wages).

ARTICLE 11

Business Agent

The Employer shall not prevent the Business Agent(s) of the Union from having access to the Employer's projects. Upon arrival at the project, the Business Agent(s) shall advise the Project Office of his presence.

ARTICLE 12

Stewards

No discrimination shall be shown against any Steward for carrying out his duties, It is also agreed that the Union (or Local Union) will advise the Foreman of the appointment of Steward(s). It is further agreed that Steward(s) will be appointed on all jobs of the Employer by the Union (or Local Union) and that he shall be one of the last two Journeymen retained by the Employer on the job. The Foreman shall advise the Union (or Local Union) before discharging a Steward. Should a Partner or Employer be directing the Bricklayers, Stonemasons and/or Plasterers on a project he shall be considered as being the Foreman and shall notify the Union (or Local Union) before discharging a Steward. Should a project experience a cessation of work it is agreed that upon resumption of work the Steward, if available, shall be one of the first Employees recalled.

ARTICLE 13 Lay Off and Quittance

(a) One hour's advance notice shall be given and paid for whenever employees are laid offor dismissed. Lay offs shall only take place at the end of the regular working day/or designated shift

except for incompetency. Employees shall receive their pay and record of employment at the time of lay off and be permitted to leave the job after notice is given.

On Refractory shift work as outlined in Article 22, should job completion on a designated shift be less than four (4) hours, then the Employee(s) shall receive a minimum of four (4) hours pay at the designated shift rate. If job completion on a designated shift exceeds eight (8) hours then the Employee(s) shall receive a minimum pay of the designated shift rate as if the entire shift were worked.

- (b) Any Employee who voluntarily leaves his employment shall have his wages and record of employment by the next regular pay day.
- (c) Employees who do not receive their pay and record of employment at the time of lay off shall receive two (2) hours pay at the regular hourly rate for each working day or designated shift until such time as the Employer mails the Employee's pay by registered or certified mail. The days for which the allowance of two (2) hours is paid shall not include the day on which the Employee's pay was mailed. In the case of work carried out under the refractory conditions (Article 21) employers must issue layoff pay and necessary forms within 48 hours, except weekends and holidays.

ARTICLE 14

Supplies by Employers

Mason lines, paper cups and potable drinking water shall be supplied to the Employees, from a clean covered container having a drain faucet, and an adequate supply of potable drinking water and paper cups shall be readily accessible for the workmen at all times. All such cups shall be deposited in receptacles as provided.

The Employer agrees to supply all special tools and equipment which are notnormally contained in the tool kits of the Employees covered by this Agreement.

ARTICLE 15 Work Break

It is agreed that Employees shall be given two (2) ten (10) minute breaks on each regularworking, evening or night work, or designated shift with no loss of pay. The Employer or Foreman shall exercise his discretion as to when the breaks shall occur, but every reasonable effort shall be made to schedule such break at the mid-way points of the working period as defined. Where refreshments are available, arrangements shall be made to have orders taken on behalf of and delivered to the Employees in the work area.

ARTICLE 16 Working Conditions

- (a) It is agreed that Employees shall be paid for lost time up to the end of the regular working day or designated **shift** in which there have been delays caused due to shortage of materials or equipment or failure of equipment which is under the direct control of the Employer.
- (b) It is agreed that when using 20cm solids (100%) 25cm and 30cm regular, semi-solids (75%) and solid (100%) standard aggregate concrete blocks, two (2) employees shall work in pairs to lay said blocks. It is further agreed that othermasonry units that weigh in excess of twenty-five kilograms (25 kgs), two (2) employees shall work in pairs to lay said units. This shall not however, apply to lightweight blocks such as cinder, haydite or slag other than 25cm (100% solid) and 30cm semi-solid (75%) or solid (100%) cinder, haydite or slag.
- (c) The Employer recognizes and agrees that it is in the interest of productivity to maintain all scaffolds at a safe and proper working height. The Employer also agrees that where possible side brackets will be utilized on all scaffolds.
- (d) A working foreman shall receive not less than one dollar (\$1.00) per hour above a Journeyman's rate as defined in Article 29, and may be transferred between Local Union areas.
- (e) It is agreed that if a company is comprised **of two** or more Principals or Owners not more than one Principal or Owner shall be permitted to work with the tools of the trade on any one project. Any Principal or Ownerworking with the tools of the trade or any

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member of the Union shall only do so in compliance with same working conditions having particular regard to the hours of work and other related working conditions.

- (f) Employees covered by this Agreement shall only provide service on the hourly rated basis as defined in Article 29 and any Union member contracting masonry work shall abide by the provisions of this Agreement.
- (g) Should an Employeereceive an injury or become ill which causes him to leave the jobsite the Employer shall instruct an Employee to arrange for the safekeeping of such Employee's tools and clothes without loss of pay.
- (h) When an Employee is injured on the jobsite and must leave the job for medical attention or when the Doctor decides he is unable to return to the job because of the injury, or if instructed by the Foreman or Superintendent to go home he shall be paid his regular wages and other benefits for the full eight (8) hours per day or designated shift, whichever is the greater. If in the opinion of the Employer another Employee is required to leave the jobsite with the injured or ill Employee, to assist him in getting medical attention, he shall be paid his regular wages and other benefits for any lost time incurred in this way. Transportation when necessary shall be arranged by the Employeroo a Doctor's office or hospital. The Local Union Office and the Employer shall be notified immediately of an accident to an Employee where loss of time is involved.
- (i) Members of the Union will not be permitted to work for out of Province Employers working in Ontario unless that Employer is party to the Ontario Provincial Agreement and agrees to abide by all terms and conditions of that Agreement.
- (j) An Employee injured in the performance of his duties and who is medically fit to return to work shall be reinstated where practicable and where the job is not yet completed.

For Plasterers Only

- **(k)** Closed scaffolds shall be provided by the Employer on all stationary scaffolds.
- (I) The Employer shall supply **darbies**, straight edges, feather edges, plumb and cornice rods when necessary.

- (m) All bullnoses, chamfers and coves one to six inches must be run by mold conforming to the usual methods.
- (n) All brick, tile, block or gypsum block walls in the browning must be **screeded** with rod, both vertical and horizontal and all browning must be floated. Screeds must be true and straight and all angles must be feather edged straight and true in the finishing coat

ARTICLE 17 All Benefit Plans

- (a) It is agreed that established Local Employee Benefit Plans may be varied, provided that such cost variation shall be taken from the total negotiated wage package.
- (b) It is further agreed that the Union or Local Union may establish a benefit trust plan provided that such plan is jointly and equally trusted and that the cost to fund such plan is taken from the total negotiated wage package.
- (c) Employee Dues Deductions Plans shall also comply with (a) and (b) above except for the requirement of being jointly Trusted.
- (d) Such Plans shall be reviewed by and filed with the Ontario Joint Conference Board, Any new Benefit Plans, or changes to existing Benefit Plans, will only be implemented on the date(s) scheduled for changes (or Anniversary Date) in the Total Wage Package and will require at least ninety (90) days notice to become effective, unless such delay would jeopardize the continuity of an existing Plan, in which case upon proof of such facts, the ninety (90) day notice is waived.
- (e) All deductions and contributions as outlined in Article 29 shall be paid not later than the 15th day of the Month following the Month in which they were earned. The combined payments shall be deposited in accordance with the designated place appearing on the Employers Monthly Contribution Report Form.

There shall be a maximum of two (2) remittance forms used when contributions are sent in by the Employers each month.

The first form shall have the Local Union's Administered Plans and Employer/Employee Contributions (refer to Article 29) such

as, Local Union's Dues check-off, S.U.B. Plans, Welfare & Dental Plans, and Local Pension. These contributions shall be broken down individually on the form and then totalled at the bottom with only "one (1) cheque" written to the Local Union or designate.

The second form shall include all of the Provincial Benefit Plans and Employer/Employee contributions as spelled out in the Collective Agreement (refer to Article 29). These contributions shall be broken down individually on the form and then totalled with only "one (1) cheque" written to the designate.

- (f) If the Employer does not have any members in his employ a Nil Report shall be tiled by the Employer on a Monthly report Form in accordance with Section (e) above. All Report Forms shall be required to contain a space in which an Employer can indicate that he is filing his last report for that Local.
- (g) The Parties agree that all Welfare, Dental, Pension, SUB Plans will provide an equitable reciprocity provision with each Plan in the Province of Ontario in order to promote mobility of the work force.
- (h) See Appendix "H" for all Union and Local Union Benefit Plans.

ARTICLE 18

Travel, Room & Board

The territorial jurisdictions of Local #1 Hamilton and #2 Toronto shallremain asdefined in Appendix "B" and the Free Travel Zones shall be as follows:

1. Local #1 Hamilton

Free Travel Zone - shall be Sixteen (16) kilometres from the Hamilton City Hall using the most practical direct route.

Travel Allowance - When an Employee is required to work outside the Free travel **Zone** as defined above he shall receive a **travel allowance effective May 4th, 1988, twenty-nine cents (29¢)** per kilometre, (effective May 1,1989, thirty cents (30¢) each way.) The number of kilometres in question shall be based on the most practical direct route from the boundary of the Free Travelling area to the **jobsite**. Travel Allowance shall not exceed Board Allowance as defined in Section 5 hereinafter.

2. Local #2 Toronto

(a) **Zone** 1 - Downtown Expenses
The following downtown expenses shall be paid when an Employee is required to work within an area bounded by the East boundary of Dufferin Street on the West, inclusive of C.N.E. grounds to the Lake and the Toronto Islands on the South, the South boundary of Bloor Street on the North, and the West boundary of Jarvis Street on the East.

> Effective May 1,1990 - \$5.50 per day Effective May 1,1991 - \$6.00 per day

Also Public Transit costs to and from daily, the area known as the Toronto Islands or any subsequent title given to that geographical location.

(b) Zone 2 - No Travelling Allowance

From the boundaries of Zone 1 to the area bounded by the East boundary of Highway #427(27) on the West, the South Boundary of Highway #7 on the North, and the West boundary of Kennedy Road on the East.

Zone 3 - Travelling Allowance Daily

Effective May 1, 1990 - \$7.50 per day

From the boundaries of Zone 2, to the boundaries of the Territorial Jurisdiction defined in Appendix "B" as amended.

- Travelling Allowance shall be paid regardless of point of residence.
- (e) On projects located outside the geographic area of Local #2 as defined in Appendix "B", travel allowance at the applicable rate as defined in Section 4 hereinafter measured from the boundary of the Free Travel Zone (Zone 1) to the project and return using the most practical direct route shall be paid. Travel Allowance shall not exceed the Board Allowance as defined in Section 5 hereinafter.

3. Free Travel Zone

All other Local Unions' Free Travel Zone shall be twenty-five (25) kilometres measured by the most direct practical route from the City Hall of the Cities in which the Local Union is located except as in #4 St. Catharines (Centre of Allenburg), #6 Windsor (Union Hall) and Chatham City Hail, #7 Ottawa (ChateauLaurier, Federal Post Offices of Pembroke, Renfrew, Arnprior, Egansville, Barry's Bay, Deep River, Cornwall and Hawkesbury), #2 Barrie (Barrie Town Hall, Huntsville Town Hall) based on the nearest point to the residence of the employee, #12 Kitchener (Waterloo Wellington Airport Tower, Brantford City Hall, Owen Sound City Hall, Mount Forest Post Office) based on the nearest point to the residence of employee, #20 Oshawa (City Post Office), #25 Thunder Bay (Labour Centre, Federal Buildings of Ignace, Sioux Lookout, Dryden, Kenora, Emo, Fort Frances, Atikokan, Nipigon, Terrace Bay and Marathon), #28 Sudbury (The Federal Buildings of Sudbury, North Bay, Kirkland Lake, Timmins, Kapuskasing, Cochrane, Timiskaming and Parry Sound), #29. Sault Ste. Marie (Civic Centre), and #10 Kingston (City Halls of Belleville, Brockville, Kingston and Peterborough).

(b) Local #7 Ottawa - the Free Travel Zone measured by the most direct practical route shall be sixteen (16) kilometres from the City Hall of Smith Falls, Perth, Carleton Place and Kemptville.

4. Travel Allowance

When Employees provide their own transportation from the boundary of the Free Travel Zone as defined in Section 3 herein, they shall be paid travel allowance at the following applicable rate:

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Effective May 1,1991 - 34¢ per kilometre Effective May 1,1994 - 36¢ per kilometre
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to the project and return per day using the most practical direct route. Travel Expenses shall not exceed Board Allowance as defined in Section 5 hereinafter.

5. Board Allowance

(a) Board Allowance for all Local Unions shall be as follows:

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Effective May 1,1991 - $58.00 per day Effective May 1,1993 - $60.00 per day Effective May 1,1994 - $62.00 per day
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(b) On projects where Board Allowance applies, and located two hundred and one (201) kilometres or less from the boundary of the Free Travel Zone of all Local Unions the applicable Board Allowance shall be paid on the basis of five (5) days per week.

Travel Allowance at the applicable rates as defined in Section 4 herein shall be paid to the project and return to the Free Travel Zone boundary once per project in addition to the applicable Board Allowance.

- (c) On the projects where Board Allowance applies and locatedmore than two hundred and one (201) kilometres from the boundary of the Free Travel Zones of all Local Unions, the applicable Board Allowance shall be paid on the basis of seven (7) days per week. Travel Allowance at the applicable rates as defined in Section 4 herein shall be paid to the project and return to the Free Travel Zone Boundary once per project in addition to the applicable Board Allowance.
- 6. Employees instructed to travel from one project to another during the regular working day **after** having reported to the initial **jobsite** shall be paid Travel Allowance at the applicable rate as defined in Section 4 herein, using the most practical direct route in addition to his regular hourly rate.
- 7. All Travel Allowances and Board Allowances shall be paid weekly by cash or cheque and within four (4) working days of the closing day of the pay period and identified separately from wages.
- 8. When Employees are instructed to travel to projects located more than two hundred and one (201) kilometres from the Free Travel Zone Boundary of all Local Unions and return, the Employer shall pay the cost for all such transportation and meals. The Employer shall be required to pay travelling time based on the applicable regular straight time hourly rate of the area in which The Employee resides and holds membership to an maximum of eight (8) hours in any one day. When the time required to travel to the project is less than eight (8) hours, the Employee shall work the balance of his regular working period when requested to do so.
- 9. (a) Return Public Transportation costs shall be paid to any Employee by the Employer on the following basis on projects located from the Boundary of the Free Travel Zone of the Employee's Local from which he was hired.
 - -322 kilometresup to 644 kilometres one round trip every two
 (2) months.
 - 644 kilometresup to 966 kilometres one round trip every four
 (4) months.
 - over 966 kilometres one round trip every six (6) months.

- **(b)** On projects of more than ninety **(90)** days duration should an Employee leave prior to completion of the project, for reasons other than compassionate grounds, Travel Allowances and Travel Time may be withheld.
- 10. When camp conditions are of necessity in lieu of the Board Allowance defined in Section 5 herein, it is agreed that such camp conditions shall be of **first** class accommodations and such accommodation conditions shall be established prior to the commencement of work.

Employer and Employee Deductions & Contributions

(a) Each Employer shall contribute the relevant amount as per Article 29 per hour for each hour earned by each Employee covered by this Agreement including the indicated amounts that shall be allocated to The Ontario Masonry Promotion Fund, and the Provincial Training Trust Fund. Overtime work shall be considered on a straight time basis.

All fringe benefitsand Local Union deductions shall be paid on the basis of hours earned.

Hours earned shall mean the amount received by the Employee (before deductions and not including vacation pay) divided by the hourly wage rate.

(b) Each Employee agrees that each Employer shall deduct the relevant amount as per Article 29 per hour for each hour earned including the indicated amounts that shall be allocated to the Ontario Masonry Promotion Fund, and the Provincial Training Trust Fund. Overtime work shall be considered on a straight time basis.

All fringe benefits and Local Union deductions shall be paid on the basis of hours earned.

Hours earned shall mean the amount received by the Employee (before deductions and not including vacation pay) divided by the hourly wage rate.

- (c) Deductions and contributions shall be compiled monthly and the Employer shall forward the combined amounts together with an Employer Report Form, provided by the Union to the designated place appearing on the Employer's Monthly Contribution Report Form to be received not later than the 15th of each month following the month for which such deductions and contributions were earned. Copies of the Employers Report Form shall also be forwarded to the Local Joint Committee as established in (d).
- (d) The Local Union and Local Employer shall establish a Local Joint Committee of equal representation to scrutinize and verify the hours earned and payments made. Any discrepancies or late payments shall be dealt with by the Local Joint Committee and the Employer concerned.
- (e) The Ontario Provincial Conference on receipt of such remittance shall within five (5) working days remit relevant amounts as per Article 29 per hour for each hour earned by each employee to the Ontario Masonry Contractors Association together with a photocopy of the Employers Report Forms.
- (f) The two cent (2¢) contribution and the two cent (2¢) deduction shall be allocated to a Fund to be know as the Ontario Masonry Industry Promotion Trust Fund which shall be jointly trusted by equal representation of Employers and the Union.
- (g) The five cent $(5\not e)$ contribution and the live cent $(5\not e)$ deduction shall be allocated to the Provincial Training Trust Fund which shall be jointly trusted by equal representation from M.I.E.C.O and the O.P.C.

Delinquent Remittances - Penalties

When remittances in accordance with Articles 17 and 19 are over ten (IO) days in arrears, the Employer shall pay to the Trustees, as liquidated damages and not as a penalty, an amount equal to two (2) percent per month, or portion thereof up to twenty-four (24) percent per annum of such delinquent contributions, unless the Employer has corrected such delinquency within five (5) days of being given written notice.

In addition, the delinquent employer shall be required to pay all costs of collection of such liquidated damages and may be required,

upon request of the Trustees, to deposit with the Trustees a Cash Deposit, Irrevocable Letter of Credit or Equivalent Acceptable Security to a maximum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars.

Should a delinquent Employer refuse to pay the penalty herein provided, it is agreed the Employees of such delinquent Employer may refuse to work for such Employer until the Employer has complied with all obligations regarding remittances and / or penalties.

Refusal to work by Employees shall not be a violation of this agreement or an unlawful stoppage of work within the provisions of the Ontario Labour Relations Act, and the Employer shall not institute orcommence any applications, actions or proceedings of any nature whatsoever under the Ontario Labour Relations Act, this Agreement or otherwise against the Union or any of its Officers, Officials, Servants, Employees, Agents or Members in connection with any such refusal to work.

ARTICLE 21

Refractory Conditions - Meaning "Firebrick, Acid Resistant Structural Materials, Carbon, Graphite Materials, Gunite, Acid Resistant, Tar Impregnated Brick and All Other Refractory Materials"

I. Sawman

- (a) Employees, while engaged as a **Sawman**, shall receive a premium rate of thirty cents (30¢) an hour above the basic refractory rate for the hours spent operating the saw and shall wear all safety clothing provided.
 - (b) All protective equipment to be supplied by the Employer.
- (c) Employers will, where practical, assign one Bricklayer for each saw.

2. Stackwork

- (a) For work on a stack the wage rate shall be the base rate as stipulated in the Provincial Agreement Article 21(6), refractory conditions plus a premium of \$2.00 per hour commencing at the base of the structure and shall cease when the structure is completed. The premium pay shall not apply to reporting pay and further shall not be multiplied by overtime premiums.
 - (b) the above premium shall not apply to blast furnace work.

3. Transportation

If Bricklayers are required to walk more than one-half (1/2) mile from the centre of the parking lot assigned to the contractor to the project, transportation between the parking lot and the project shall be provided. This may be varied by agreement at a pre-job conference.

4. Facilities

- (a) As warranted when graphite, carbon, acid, tar impregnated brick, gunite work and on all work on blast furnace relines and coke oven repairs, coveralls and gloves shall be provided by the Employer and such clothing shall remain the property of the Employer.
- (b) The Employer agrees to provide clean hot and cold water, soap and clean individual paper towels and provide sufficient time to wash up. Such facilities described herein shall be provided at commencement of the appropriate work herein.
- (c) Where dust conditions prevail, adequate ventilation will be provided, and Employee will be provided with proper respiratory equipment.

5. Laid Off or Dismissed

The Employers agree to notify the Steward forthwith when an Employee has been laid off or dismissed.

6. Basic Refractory Wages and Premiums

- (a) Minimum basic refractory rate shall be paid at a premium of no less than thirty-five cents (35¢) per hour earned over the established rate as set out in Article 29, Wages, Deductions and Contributions.
- (b) Employees working with carbon and/or graphite materials shall be paid a premium of fifty cents $(50 \not e)$ per hour earned over the prescribed basic refractory rate as set out in (a) above.
- (c) Employees working where the temperature of the immediate working area is one hundred and fifty degrees (150°) Fahrenheit or sixty-fivedegrees (65°) Celcius, shall be paid a premium of fifty cents (50¢) per hour earned over the prescribed basic refractory rate as set out in (a) above.
- 7.(a) Notwithstanding the Refractory Conditions established in the above, the following items shall form part of this Agreement.

- (b) Conditions in the Geographical Area of Local#23 Sarnia shall be as defined in Appendix "D".
- (c) The Agreement dated June 10th, 1974 concerning refractory work in the jurisdictional area of Local #12 Kitchener as defined in Appendix "F" (Minutes of Record).

Time of second lunch break and third coffee break to be arranged by mutual agreement for the 12 hour shift operation.

Saturday commences at 12:01 A.M. and Sunday ends at 11:59 P.M. any work done between 12:01 A.M. Saturday and 11:59 P.M. Sunday will be paid at the rate of double time.

paid at the rate of double time.

This schedule shall apply to Local Union #2 for regular and shift hours for refractory work only.
(a) Holiday as named in Article 10, will commence at 12:01 A.M. and continue for 24 hours on the calendar day on which it occurs.
(b) The column headed "Hours to be Paid" does not reflect the correct number of hours in the event that any of the hours worked on any shift fall into a Saturday, Sunday or Holiday.

Shelter

- (a) The Employer shall provide accommodation with adequate tables and seating facilities for Employees covered by this Agreement and it shall be properly constructed, heated and lighted. Said shelter shall be provided at the commencement of the work. There shall be room and provision for the safe storage of the Employees' tools and clothes and free from materials and equipment. Shelters shall be kept cleaned and sanitary daily by both parties.
- **(b)** Employees' tools and clothing lost by **fire** or theft from the shelter provided for their Storage, shall be compensated for by the Employer, on written proof of loss.

ARTICLE 24

Payment of Wages

- (a) Payment of Wages shall be made not later than Thursday of each week on the jobsite during working hours by cash or cheque or other negotiable instruments. Time books to be closed weekly and pay day shall be within four working days of the closing time of the books. The Union, in individual cases, for reasonable cause, may require that the payment shall be made by cash or certified cheque until such cause has been removed.
- (b) Accompanying the Pay, the Employer shall provide a statement for each Employee showing the Company Name, the Employee's Name, the Dates of Pay Period, the Number of Hours worked, the Rate per Hour, the Gross Pay, Travelling Allowances, Vacation Pay, Board Allowance, Deductions and Contributions and Net Pay.
- (c) Any Employee failing to receive his pay on his regular pay day shall give notice to his Employer or his representative. If the Employer does not make payment of wages before twelve(12) noon on the following working day the Employer shall pay two (2) hours pay at the applicable straighttime hourly rate in addition to his wages to the Employee for each regular work day (Monday through Friday) the delinquency continues.

Initial Reporting Time

When a member reports for work at the Employer's Shop or Job at the request of the Employer, and is told that he is not required he shall be paid a minimum of three (3) hours Wages plus Travel Allowance and/or Board Allowance when applicable.

ARTICLE 26 Reporting Time

(a) Where an Employee reports for Work at the Employer's Job and work is not available (for reasons other than inclement weather) and where the Employee had reason to believe that work in progress would be available, the Employer shall pay the Employee three (3) hours pay at the regular rate and Travelling Allowances and/or Board Allowance when applicable.

(b) Inclement Weather Reporting TimeThe Parties agree that when an Employer or his Representative makes no attempt to notify the Employees by the regular starting time whether work will or will not commence then the matter will be dealt with by a Sub Committee of Ontario Joint Conference Board immediately, and on agreement of the Joint Sub Committee a penalty of 3 hours shall beassessed by the Sub Committee for each Employee affected and such Employer shall pay the assessment immediately. Where an Employee reports for work at the Employer's Job and work is not available because of inclement weather and where the Employee has reason to believe that work in progress would be available the Employer shall pay the Employee the applicable Travel Allowance and/or Board Allowance.

ARTICLE 27 Hours of Work

- (a) The regular hours of work for work performed on Monday to Friday inclusive, shall be from 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. each day. This is no guarantee of daily or weekly hours by the Employer.
- (b) No work shall be performed at any time other than during the regular hours and days as defined in (a) unless mutually agreed by the Parties to this Agreement.

- (c) When work cannot be done during the regular work day defined in (a) above on Monday to Friday inclusive, such work may be done as an evening or night work at one and one-eighth (11/8) times the regular day rate.
- (d) On all buildings of less than eight (8) storeys, the starting point at starting timeshall be the shelter as defined in Article 23. The Employee shall leave the shelter at 8:00 a.m. and proceed to work on the Employer's time. The Employee shall leave the job at 12:00 Noon and proceed to lunch on his own time. The Employee shall proceed to work at 12:30 p.m. on the Employer's time and shall leave the job at quitting time and return to the shelter on his own time. On all buildings of eight(8) storeys or more in height, the shelter shall be provided closely adjacent to the starting point, and the eighth (8th) floor shall be known as the starting point and the Employee shall proceed to his work from this point on the Employer's time.
- (e) By mutual consent of the Local Union and the affected Employer, should inclement weather cause employees on a project to lose eight (8) hours or more during a Monday to Friday regular work week, then Saturday may be worked as make-up time, at straight time rates. Employees working on Saturday shall not work in excess of the regular work week hours on a Monday to Saturday basis, If the Employee works over the number of hours of a regular work week then double time shall apply to the excess hours. It is understood and agreed that make-up time is on a voluntary basis only. Employees not wishing to work the make-up time shall not be subject to disciplinary action or layoff.

This clause is not applicable to Refractory or Maintenance work.

ARTICLE 28 Vacation Pay Trust Fund

(a) The Parties agree to a Vacation Pay Trust Fund and its title shall be "The Ontario Provincial Conference Vacation Pay Trust Fund". Existing Vacation Pay Contributions and established method of remittances shall continue at the rate defined in Article 29. All Vacation Pay Contributions shall be compiled monthly and the total combined amounts together with an Employer Monthly Report Form provided by the Ontario Provincial Conference Vacation Pay Trust Fund shall be forwarded and to be received by the Fund Administrator not later than the 15th day of each month following

the month in which the contributions were earned. This shall apply for each work month except for the work month of May when the Vacation Pay Report Forms and the Contributions shall be received by the Fund Administrator not later than the 10th day of June.

- **(b)** Vacation Pay shall not be paid to an Employee at any time except through the provisions of the Trust Agreement.
- (c) Holiday or Vacation Period shall be the period commencing June 30th each year and the Administrator of The Ontario Provincial Conference Vacation Pay Trust Fund shall issue a cheque to each Employee for whom contributions have been received by the Administrator during the Fiscal Year as outlined in the Trust Agreement.
- (d) Vacation and holiday pay shall be at the rate of 10% of the Employee's gross wages earned. This amount includes four percent (4%) in lieu of payment for statutory holidays.

(With all signatures complete for the Local Union's File)

It is recommended by the parties that where a Local Union and a Local Employers Group agree to target a job, consideration should be given to the following contract provisions.

- Travel, Room and Board
 Hiring and Mobility
 Hours of Work
 Overtime and Shift Premiums
- Wage Rates

APPENDIX "D"

Refractory Conditions- Firebrick, Refractory Materials, Acid Resistant Structural Materials and Carbon and Graphite Materials for the Geographical Area of Local 23, Sarnia, Ontario.

In addition to the rates as established in Article 29, Wages, Deductions, Contributions, an additional One Dollar and Forty Cents (\$1.40) per hour shall be paid for the laying of acid and firebrick, also all types of refractory work to include all refractory material. Twenty Cents (20¢) perhour (40¢ per hour on overtime) above refractory rate of pay to be paid to Nozzle Operators.

Stacks and Silos

A premium of Two Dollars (\$2.00) per hour will be paid above the prevailing wage rate for work up to three hundred feet (300'). This shall include overhand work or free fall area. For each additional fifty feet (50') an additional premium of One Dollar (\$1.00) will be paid.

Shift Work

Shift work shall be defined as follows:

- An Employee or Group of Employees in relay with one another.
- 2. When work is scheduled to start after the regular starting time it shall be deemed as shift work.
- No Bricklayer shall work more than one shift in any twentyfour (24) hour period.
- When it is deemednecessary to change the scheduled shift, the Employer must notify the Business Agent or his Representative.
- When Bricklayers report for work and are notified that the length of the shift has been changed, they shall receive a minimum of eight (8) hours pay.
- 6. Bricklayers will be entitled to a smoke break every two (2) hours in a smoking area with no loss of time.

APPENDIX "E" Trade Jurisdiction

Bricklaying Masonry shall consist of the laying of bricks made from any material, in, under, or upon any structure or form of work where bricks are used, whether in the ground, or over its surface, or beneath water, in commercial buildings, rolling mills, iron works, blast or smelter furnaces, lime or brick kilns, in mines or fortifications, and in all underground work, such as sewers, telegraph, electric and telephone conduits. All cutting of joints, pointing, cleaning and setting of brick walls, pointing or caulking of masonry to masonry, fireproofing, block-arching, terra-cotta cutting and setting, the cutting, laying of all tile, mineral wool, insulation, cork blocks and glass masonry, or any substitute for the above materials, the installation of air barriers, the cutting, rubbing and grinding of all kinds of brick and the setting of all cut stone trimmings on brick buildings is bricklayers work. It shall consist of all restoration work involving the removal and replacement of existing or deteriorated masonry units. Bricklayers shall have the right to use all hand held tools or power tools and equipment which are considered necessary in the performance of their work.

The laying, cleaning, cutting and pointing of cement blocks, artificial stone, and all cement blocks that are used for backing up external wall, the building of party wall, columns, girders, beams, floors, stairs, arches and block partitions where substituted for the clay or natural stone products. The preparation, application or erection of plastic castables or any refractory materials and membrane installation on all acid work. All on-site preparation and erection ofprefabricated brick and/or block panels, including the cutting, setting, plumbing, aligning, leveling, shimming, pointing and all necessary work to complete same. Bricklayers shall have the right to use all tools which are considered necessary in the performance of their work. All cork installations and substitutes therefore where cement or other adhesivematerials are used, when such is installed in floors, wall, partitions, roofs, and ceiling insulation, including the cutting of closures to till out courses. The laying of all mono-wall and thread-line materials and the operation of all tools and applicators in connection with the mono-wall system of construction shall be the work of the bricklayer.

The laying of all rubble work with or without mortar, setting all cut stone, marble, or slate of stone work (meaning as to stone any work manufactured from such foreign or domestic products as are specified and used in the interior or on the exterior of buildings by Architects, and customarily called "Stone" in the Trade). Cutting all shoddy, broken ashlar or random ashlar, that is roughly dressed upon the beds and joints and range ashlar not over ten inches in height; the dressing of all jambs, corners and ringstone that are roughly dressed upon the bed, joints or reveals, and the cutting of a draft upon same for plumbing purpose only; and the cleaning and pointing of stone work. This is to apply to all work on buildings, sewers, bridges, railroads, bulkheads, breakwaters, jetties, playgrounds, parks, landscaping and curbing or other public works, and to all kinds of stone, particularly to the product of the locality where the work is being done, and the same shall be considered Stonemasonry.

Stonemasons shall have the right to use all tools which are considered necessary in the performance of their work. A Stonemason shall be required to provide sharp tools when starting a job and the Employer agrees to provide for the forging of these tools during the job and prior to lay-off. Stonemasons shall have the right to use all hand held tools or power tools and equipment which are considered necessary in the performance of their work.

Cutting, setting, plumbing, aligning, leveling, shimming, pointing and other necessary work involving the installation of units which have been moulded, formed or cast and having a facing of materials such as Brick, Block, Tile, Marble, Slate, Granite, natural or artificial stone may be performed by members of the Union. Granite Cladding will be performed by members of the Union.

All exterior or interior plastering, plain and ornamental, when done with stucco, cement and lime mortars or patent materials, artificial marble work, when applied in plastic form, composition work in all its branches, the covering of all walls, ceilings, soffits, piers, columns or any part of a construction of any work when covered with any plastic materials in the usual methods of plastering, is the work of the Plasterer. The casting and striking of all ornaments of plaster compositions, the cutting and filling of cracks. All cornices, moulding, coves, and bull nose shall be run in place on rods and white mortar screeds and with a regular mold and all substitutes of any kind, when applied in plastic form with a trowel, or substitute for same, dry-wall taping is the work of the Plasterer. Any material related to stucco including any thermal base that supports any acrylics shall be the work of the Plasterers or Dry-Wall Tapers.

Ceramic Welding -The Employers agree to assign to employees represented by the B.A.C. all on site maintenance, repair and renovation work involved in the ceramic welding process, including but not limited to: the handling and transportation of all materials; tools and equipment associated with ceramic welding; the operation and repair ofceramic welding equipment; all work and tasks necessary to prepare the work areas for ceramic welding; the mixing of all ceramic materials; the operation of all lancesused in performing ceramic welding; all tasks necessary to restore the work area to normal operating conditions; and any other work assignments necessary under the manufacturers requirements.

APPENDIX **"F"**MINUTES OF RECORD

March 14th, 1972

Question - D. Williams "In the event that a Steward may take action as defined in Shop Steward to stop a job for unsafe conditions would this action be considered a violation of the Agreement and subject to grievance by the Employer?"

Answer - J. Tiefenback "No".

March 16th, 1972

Lay-offs means severances from the Company.

March 29th, 1972

The Employershall pay as required under Clause 26A when an employee shows up for work and had no reason to believe that work was not available.

March 7th, 1973

Minutes of record **re** Clarification on total package. Vacation Pay impact will be in addition to negotiated monies.

April 11th, 1973

The wash-up time in the geographical area of Local **29**, **Sault Ste**. Marie shall be observed.

April 4th, 1973

Lay-OffNotice - Article 13. It is understood by the Parties that one (I) hours' pay in lieu of notice under Article 13 (a) shall be paid when a lay-off for lack of work other than for reasons of adverse weather conditions continues for a period of seven (7) consecutive days and the employee had not obtained other employment and chooses to requesthis separation slipand one hour's pay in lieu of notice.

April 18th, 1973

The Union agrees it will not sue in matters involving work jurisdictional disputes arising between two Building Trades Unions affiliated with the A.F.L. - C.I.O.

April 19th, 1973

Travel Expense and Board Allowance — Clause 5, Section B.

Should an employee be required to work on the 6th and/or 7th day of the week, said employee shall be paid Board Allowance and Travel expense where applicable for such day(s).

Section C - Should an employee not report to work due to confirmed medical illness when work is available board Allowance shall be paid up to three (3) days for such illness. An Employee absent for any other reason may have his Board Allowance withheld.

June 10th, 1974

This letter will serve to confirm the Agreement reached between Refractory Contractor Members of M.I.E.C.O., and Representatives of the Central District Council. Relative to refractory work done in the jurisdictional areas of Local 3,9,12 and 33.

It is understood and agreed that when refractory work is carried out in Locals 3, 9,12 and 33, the base rate of wages shall be the same as that shown for Local No. 1 Hamilton, under Article 29A of the Provincial Agreement.

March 3rd, 1976

Employers indicate that their understanding is that rubber gloves, aprons and goggles, etc., are not normally contained in a kit of tools and would be supplied where the work requires such items

March 31st, 1976

Employees shall report to the Foreman any unsafe conditions, unsafe acts or violations of Standard Safety Regulations of the Construction Safety Act for his immediate attention.

In the event the Foreman is not available to rectify the situation, the Stewart may report to any other Employer Representative on the job for corrective action.

May 28th, 1976

Any fringe benefit(s) contained in the Collective Agreement that are discontinued for any reason shall revert and be added to the hourly wage rate of the Local Union affected.

May 28th, 1976

All fringe benefits and local union deductions shall be paid on the basis of hours earned.

Hourseamed shall mean the amountreceived by the Employee (before deductions and not including vacation pay) divided by the hourly wage rate.

May 28th, 1976

Gunite - Local Unions agree to cooperate in providing nozzle operators whenever requested. When nozzle operators are not available, Employers will be permitted to bring Employees from another Local Union.

April 29th, 1978

Where a **pre-job** conference for mark up has been arranged the Ontario Provincial Conference will be **recognized**.

April 30th, 1978

Height Pay Local 25 Thunder Bay Only.

For Local **25** Thunder Bay and work on Paper Mills Only. Time and one-half shall be paid for all work performed on swing stages or suspended scaffolds **fifty (50)** feet in height or over.

April 22nd, 1980

Should any other Union that M.I.E.C.O. is bargaining with achieve the time and one-halfpayment for all workperformed on swing stages or suspended scaffolds at a height of fifty (50) feet

or less, then Local 25 Thunder Bay shall receive same for work performed on paper mills only.

June 26th, 1980

Local 29 Sault Ste. Marie

The payment of wages to Employees who are laid off in the geographical area of Local #29, Sault Ste. Marie will continue according to the arrangement that existed during the term of the 1978/80 Provincial Agreement.

May 15th, 1986

The Union suggests that M.I.E.C.O. agree, during the life of the May 1986 - April 30, 1988 Agreement, that meetings be held with a view to working out a formula for wage parity.

April 14th, 1988

The Union agrees to establish a Joint Committee to consider the merger of all benefit plans and a common remittance form.

April 30th, 1988

The Union has undertaken to assure the employers that situations which prompted the Employers to add this to the list of proposals are rectified. Union and Management now agree to meet with the Employers and Executive Board in Local 25, Thunder Bay to see that abuses regarding Travel, Room and Board payments are rectified.

April 30th, 1988

Union and Management (O.P.C. and M.I.E.C.O.) agree to meet with the Employers and the Executive Boards of Local 7, 8, 10 (Ottawa, Barrie, Kingston) to try and work out the incorporation of the Locals in Zone 4 into Zone 2. Said meeting(s) to be initiated within three (3) months of the signing of this memorandum.

May 1, 1988

By mutual consent by both parties, should inclement weather cause employees on a project to lose eight hours or more during a Monday to Friday work week, then Saturday may be worked as make-up-time at straight time rates. Employees working on the Saturday shall not work in excess of forty hours (40) on a Monday to Saturday basis. If the employeeworks over forty hours (40) then double time rates shall be applicable.

It is understood and agreed that make-up-time is on avoluntary basis only. Employees not wishing to work the make-up-time shall not be subjected to disciplinary action or lay off.

This Clause is not applicable to Refractory, Maintenance work and Local 2, Toronto and will expire on April 30th, 1989 at which time it may be subject to be renegotiated for a further period of one (1) year.

March 21, 1990

The installation of Air Barriers, as referred to in Appendix "F" (Trade Jurisdiction) means Air Barrier Systems installed on masonry and/or concrete.

April 11, 1990

0.P.C. and M.I.E.C.0. agree to establish a common remittance form, with the intent to have it become effective no laterthan May 1, 1991.

April 25, 1990

Both parties agree **thatthey** will abide by the recommendations of the Masonry Labour/Management Health and Safety Committee on the use of portable, hand held masonry saws.

April 25, 1990

By mutual consent of Local 25, Thunder Bay and the affected Employer, the regular Hours of Work may be changed, providing in so doing, it will not exceed forty (40) hours per week on individual projects where a majority of the employees cannot commute daily. This provision shall not apply to any work that is covered in the provisions of Article 21.

April 26, 1990

WHMIS Training will be provided through a joint effort of 0.P.C. and M.I.E.C.0., coordinated by the Labour/Management Health and Safety Committee, both for new Union members and foruntrained currentmembers. (Listings to be established as soon as possible) Training Manuals and Instructors will be provided by the Employers, but training time will be at no cost to the Employer.

June 11, 1992

Re: Refractory Foreman

It is understood that when a Refractory project is **of more** than one **shift** operation that the Employer shall be permitted one Foreman per shift.

July 28, 1995

Within ninety (90) days M.I.E.C.O. and the O.P.C., agree to convene meetings to consider proposals regarding the International Masonry' Institute Program.

APPENDIX "G" Local Union #10 Kingston Union Dues Deduction

Union Due Check-off shall be deducted by the Employer on the 2nd week of the month the dues apply. Remittances to Local Union #10 Kingston shall be paid and must be received on or before the 1 st day of the following month.

Pension", it is hereby agreed by and between all parties bound by and/or who adopt the provisions of the Agreement, the reference to Prov. Pension shall be acknowledged to refer to the Bricklayers and Trowel Trades International Pension Fund—Canada(the "Fund"), and is further understood and agreed by and between all parties bound by or who adopt the provisions of the Agreement, that each Employer shall:

- 1. Commence or continue from the date of signing or adoption of the Agreement or any subsequent renewal thereof, to pay to the Fund the applicable hourly amount defined in Article 29 titled Prov. Pension, in the manner provided for in Article 17, Sub Sections (e) and (f) of the Agreement, and
- 2. Be bound and abide by the Restated Agreement and Declaration of Trust dated December 31,1975, of the Bricklayers and Trowel Trades International Pension Fund Canada and hereby confirms all actions taken by the Trustees pursuant to the Restated Agreement and Declaration of Trust, and Irrevocably designates as its representatives on the Board of Trustees such Employer Trustees as are now serving and their successors.

APPENDIX "J" Letters of Understanding

Re: Appendix "B" (Territorial Jurisdiction of the Ontario Provincial Conference) Merger of Former Local #8 Barrie and Local #2 Toronto

It is understood that with reference to Article 29 Wages, that the schedule pertaining to Local #2 Barrie refers to those projects located in-the geographical area of the County of Simcoe, Cities of Barrie and Orillia, District of Muskoka. Township of Mulmur in the County of Dufferin, Burkes Falls, Parry Sound, Beaverton and surrounding territories. It is understood that with respect to the union security provisions in the Barrie Toronto jurisdiction only then the following clause is applicable:

Where a Union has more than one Hiring Hall List in the area where the work is to be performed, and if there are insufficient members available in the area to take care of the needs of the Employer, then the Employers have the right to bring in members of the Local Union who do not reside in the area where the work is being performed. These members who do not reside in the area shall be allowed to remain on the job site until completion.

It is understood that for these projects located in the former Local #8 Barrie geographical jurisdiction that all employees will be obtained from the unemployed list of members that were former members of Local #8, subject to Article 5 as amended above.

Re: Concessions Authorized by O.J.C.B. (during Provincial Collective Agreement May 1st, 1992 to April 30th, 1995)

All matters previously settledand agreed to by **the parties prior** to the date hereof.

It is agreed that concession rates applicable to projects bid between January 1, 1994 and April 30, 1995 and expiring April 30, 1995. Will return to the full book rate for the period May 1, 1995 to June 22, 1995. In consideration of this, the Union agrees to retarget the jobs at their original concession rates until thee arlier of completion or December 3 1, 1995. All outstanding monies in respect of outstanding grievances shall immediately be paid to the

O.P.C. by the applicable Employers for distribution to the Local Unions and to the Local Members. Upon receipt of such monies the O.P.C. shall withdraw each individual grievance.

Article 5 as per Current Agreement. Job Targeting, as per revised 3 **(f)** and new 3 **(g)**, and Letter of Understanding.
